

PHL 640: Ethics and Economics:

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This course is designed to provide some deep background thinking in the foundations of free enterprise and its critics. The course will count as part of the new competency in business ethics, awarded to graduate students who complete courses in designated areas. (It will be invaluable on the job market.) We will begin by reading Foucault's THE BIRTH OF BIOPOLITICS. As we are reading this text we will weave in work from Adam Smith (the "grandfather" of industrialized free enterprise) and Marx, its most virulent critic. We will then read some essays from more contemporary writers, from the Austrian school and the Chicago School, and essays that students find relevant to this topic. Students will be expected to participate and do class presentations on topics of readings of their interest or expertise.

EVALUATIONS: Class discussion is key in a graduate course from my perspective. That dialogue is more important to your learning than anything I will lecture on. So I will expect that from each of you and call on those who are not as talkative. 30%

Presentation: Each student will be expected to take a topic and do a class presentation (20-30 minutes plus discussion.) This does not require a prepared paper to be distributed in advance, but an outline of your remarks will improve the class participation. 25%

Final paper: on a topic of your choice (from the class materials or a comparison of those thinkers we have read with someone else. DO NOT SURPRISE ME. Please discuss the topic with me before launching on writing it. Ideally, the paper should be a draft of a publishable article. You may use your class presentation as a jumping-off point for a paper. 45%
